## What's in store for

THE YEAR OF THE DRAGON!

For all the rain we had in spring and the early summer of 2011, the sunnier weather we had in August, the drier conditions we had in September and October, we did get a great harvest. Those conditions, along with the relatively mild winter we've had so far, indicate that the permanent plants in our gardens should come through the winter well this year.

This should give us a great start to this gardening year. With all the wonderful new seeds, bulbs, and plants we have coming this spring, we're very excited for the season that will soon be upon us! Again, we have Central Alberta's widest selection of garden seeds. While there are still no genetically engineered seeds available, we do have an amazing selection of heritage, heirloom, and organically grown seeds. There's also a line of Cook's Choice seeds with a recipe on every packet.

New this year is a selection of compact veggies, ideal for container growing on your patio or step. Included in the vegetable seeds are numerous unique novelty varieties for those who want to grow something unusual in their vegetable garden! New from McKenzie are multi-variety seed pellets, that come with two or more colors of petunia combined in each pellet, for "instant" mixed pots.

Begonia tubers and spring bulbs have arrived, and all other flower bulbs will be here by mid March. Back are all the old favorites, and a few new additions; like the giant tree lily "Lavon", growing 3-4 ft tall the first year, 5-6 ft the second year, and 6-8 ft the third year. It produces huge fragrant blooms

in soft yellow with red centers. Also new: a couple of varieties of striped dahlias called "Pippi", and "Santander", and a new burgundy martagon lily called "Russian Morning". These will

definitely add An exciting new look to our summer gardens.

In the greenhouse we also have some exciting new items: the Bacopa Calypso series provides even larger

blooms on the ever popular trailing plant. The Mosaic series of Coleus gives us three bright new foliage colors for shade gardens. In the Calibrachoas we have added the new "Double Lavender," and "Double Ruby," from Proven Winners. The all new Osteospermum "3-D Double Purple" is fully double and stays open even in cloudy weather! The Balconita Pansy provides three new colors of trailing pansies for frost tolerant hanging baskets for spring and fall. Last year we intro-

> duced Petunia "Black Velvet", this year there is another called "Black Satin". Even more exciting, a whole new color of petunia this year called "Pink Lemonade" a soft yellow with pink highlights. It should look stunning blended with black petunias. We also have a new red thunbergia called "Serengeti Dark Red," this would look great combined with the yellow thunbergias!

> Our bedding plants will carry a new lime colored petunia "Debonaire Lime Green" that should blend very nicely with rose, lavender or blue colors. Heritage tomatos have proven very popular the last few years, and we have added a new black variety called "Indigo Rose", and an early bush type called "Northern Delight"

# Mother Nature's

Tropical houseplants provide so many natural benefits to our indoor living environments, no home or office should be without them. They range from small window sill plants, to lush hanging pots of cascading foliage, to tall floor specimens, and also rative containers of assorted colorful plants. They clean the air, provide enhanced humidity and sometimes mixed deco-

> naturally provid-

fragrance. All of this makes the air healthier to breath. The general "life-presence" they exude tends to reduce stress in the room. Because all plants are living things, they must always be ed with proper light, heat, water, and nutrition. Here are some helpful hints.

> 1. Flowering plants and those with colorful foliage generally require high light levels, so they need to be placed near the window or other similar light source.

2. Good quality water is a must. Strive to use rain water, melted snow, bottled or distilled water. Avoid water direct from the tap, as it generally contains too many adverse minerals.

3. Occasionally wiping the leaves with a damp cloth will keep leaves cleaner and healthier looking, and goes a long way to keeping unwanted insect pests at bay.

> 4. A mild feeding of tropical plant fertilizer at every watering, such as Plant Prod 20-20-20, keeps them well nourished. A teaspoon per gallon of water at every watering works very well.

5. Avoid cold drafts near doors, and also hot dry drafts near heat vents.

6. Turn them from time to time to encourage balanced growth.

7. Occasional light trimming will encourage bushier growth

## Caring for the Birds

## Vegetable Gardening and Design

As we go forward in this era of sustainability people are rediscovering the joy of growing their own vegetables. However, many think this means only large, in-ground gardens and lots of work. ## Going Green Indoors

Environmental awareness and "going green" is becoming more and more important in today's world, and when these concerns are mentioned, most people think first of the great outdoors. However, our indoor environment is equally important. Adding some plants to your interior décor provides many benefits. First, they soften the décor and create a more relaxing atmosphere – a very real benefit after a busy day at work. It also provides the therapeutic effects of gardening through the long winter months when gardening is not possible outdoors. Increased humidity, less carbon dioxide, more oxygen and reduce air pollutants are added benefits to make breathing easier. A few large floor plants, some hanging

plants, or even some smaller flowering plants on the window sill can add a real breath of fresh air to any room. Remember, those with colorful foliage, or flowering plants, generally require bright light to full sun, while most green foliage plants will tolerate lower light levels. However, dark corners or rooms



without windows are not ideal for even low-light plants. Equally important is the water quality, even more so than quantity and frequency of watering. We recommend rain water, melted snow, or distilled water.

If insects appear, we recommend bringing in a sample for accurate diagnosis, but most often the safe and healthy control will consist of wiping, cleaning, hand-picking, or trimming and disposal of the affected parts.

Do not use household soaps as they are often damaging to the plants. Drop in soon and often to view our ever-changing selection of indoor plants and our garden-safe line of plant care products and let us help you enhance your environment!

# EDIBLE LANDSCAPING

Food plays a central role in everyone's life. Homegrown food is to be considered more nutritious than commercially produced food. Edible landscaping can also help reduce pest problems, enhance soil fertility, while providing you with homegrown fruits, vegetables and herbs. Destructive bugs will have a harder time finding individual plants than they do a whole row in a garden. Plants that are grown specifically to be cut down and returned to the soil as fertilizer will enhance soil fertility. Also, edible landscaping involves beds that are not completely replanted each year, therefore would not be tilled every year like a garden would be. Repeated tilling breaks down the soil structure.

The mind-set of most people is that flowers have to be in a specific spot, herbs have to have their own real estate and vegetables have their own location as well. But that is not true! In your flower beds, mix and match amongst your flowers some herbs or vegetables. Consider using your trellis for climbers such as beans, peas. Edible landscaping can also be incorporated into flower pots. Consider planting a tomato plant with a low growing flowering plant. If you are new at this ask the specialists at Parkland Garden Centre which flowers will work best with a vegetable or herb plant.

Things to consider while creating an edible landscape:

1. **Start small -** try a few potato plants, carrots, or only herbs that you know you will use.

2. Choose appropriate sites - food plants need sunny locations for you to benefit from their nutritional content.

3. **Plant competition -** non compatible plants, remember larger plants such as a shrub can take away most of the water and nutrients in the soil, leaving smaller plants struggling. Make sure you have a water source, or hose, that can reach them.

4. **Wildlife** - birds and animals will be attracted to your edible landscape. If you plant a berry bush in your front flower bed for pies, keep in mind the City of Red Deer is home to many deer, that may wander up to your flower beds and thank you for the open buffet.

5. **Trade-offs -** if you were used to spraying your garden for pests, your spray may kill your other flowering plants. As mentioned earlier, pest control should be under control, as they will not be able to find your strawberry plant amongst your marigolds.

6. **Know what you are growing -** if you are adventurous and want to try other edible plants (other than fruits and vegetables), know what they are and how to prepare. Only eat a small amount as issues such as an allergic reaction could be the outcome.

There are many books, which Parkland carries, to help you with your edible landscaping, do your research. If you are still uncertain how to incorporate a few potatoes, carrots, herbs into your flower beds, the specialists at Parkland Garden Centre will be more than happy to assist you.
